Many people do not know how to make a character work or become interesting. But once you understand the fundamentals of creating a charismatic lead, it becomes easier and much more fun!

In this article, we will explore seven concepts that will help create interesting characters that stick with readers and keep drawing them into your story. These are not compulsory, but can be used to create gripping characters.

1) The Good Versus the Bad It's easy to make a character evil or good. You can be nice, or cruel. You can do good, or bad things. However, the best way that I've found to create interesting characters is through contrast between two extremes.

A classic example of this is the vampire genre. Vampires are often associated with freewill, and the desire to do good. This keeps them interesting. Because good is not concrete, you can do all sorts of things that relate to it. A vampire who turns into a bat is seen as good, because it helps him escape bad guys (an action that allows him to save human lives). But if he does something like bite a random person for no reason, he becomes bad again (because hurting people makes him bad).

A villain will want to be evil by doing evil things. A hero will want to be good by doing good things. Both of these characters will be somewhat one dimensional, but this is where the character's depth comes in. A villain who does bad things for mysterious reasons makes him/her more evil than a villain who just clearly has no regard for other people's lives. A hero who does good things but has trouble doing them because he/she has trouble facing reality makes him/her more interesting than a hero without an inner struggle.

2) Flaws versus Perfection This contrast creates even more depth to your characters. A perfect character is boring. Nobody wants to read about someone who has no flaws. Everyone has flaws. Everybody has strengths and weaknesses.

A common misconception about this is that your character should have some sort of weakness that makes them useless and brings them down "like all humans." But this kind of weakness is not interesting, and it's rarely seen in fiction, because it doesn't create tension or inner conflict. Also, giving a character strength and weaknesses will make the characters more complex and the story more unpredictable.

Good writers know how to give their characters different strengths than their counterparts, so that even if they're up against each other, they're not evenly matched (and nobody gets bored).

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
